### Editor's Bits - Morton

A few years ago, Elaine and I thought that eventually we'd settle on a Gold Wing as our regular bike, for comfy - nay, luxurious - touring. Then we tried one, and the gymnastics required to get on and off sank that idea - I think when getting on off the Deauville and becomes problematical we'll try a Street Twin. However, once moving, even that 1500 Wing could pop along and corner, so the new version of the 1800, with its new, lightweight frame, will probably surprise some people expecting to leave one way behind. It now has double wishbone front suspension with a central monoshock and a separate pair of steering rods (like BMW's Duolever?). However, it looks pretty normal, unlike this one:



This is the Motoinno (short for Motorcycle Innovation) - TS3, available in Australia, with Ducati Testastretta engine and apparently offering the following:

 Can be braked harder and later into corners, including trail braking through any corner/camber combination.

- In-line and corner trail braking does not upset front end stability or bike trajectory.
- Throttle changes during cornering do not unsettle the front end stability or trajectory.
- Directional changes during a corner do not upset front end stability and overall trajectory.

Changing the subject completely, I was surprised to find, on the DfT website, that the penalty for riding a bicycle on the pavement is £500. I don't know how widely this is applied, but while I can see the point of deterring "pavementing" in crowded town/city streets, I often find myself – particularly in the car – stuck for what seems like ages behind a cyclist when there's an empty pavement begging to be used, to provide the cyclist with safety from uncaring motorists and enable me to make progress.

Finally, in the language of heaven, Nadolig Llawen a Blwyddyn Newydd Dda and safe riding!

### Legal Questions

1. Van Man ran me over, but can I claim?

I pulled up behind a van which was on the right-hand arm of a rural Y-junction. The van driver then seemingly decided he wanted to go down the other arm of the Y, started reversing and only stopped when he felt the van hit the front of my bike despite some frantic beeping of my bike's horn. I was not injured, but the bike was forced onto its side and had some cosmetic damage. The driver said he didn't see me, but where do I stand?

#### **Answer:**

It would seem that one of two things happened to cause this accident. Either you were there to be seen but the van driver didn't check his mirrors, or there was a solid back to the van and he did check his side mirrors but in the absence of being able to check a rear-view mirror you weren't there to be seen even though he looked.

If it's the former then it would seem that a court must conclude that he was entirely at fault.

Where a vehicle has a solid back, the court may well criticise a rider who pulls up so closely behind it rather than positioning himself on the road in a place where he could be seen in the side mirror – as with a lorry, if you can't see the mirrors then the driver can't see you.

The end result would likely be a finding that the van driver was primarily to blame but there may be a degree of contributory negligence on your part, which could affect any settlement. But this is unlikely and I would need more information to be sure.

#### 2. Can I lose my car license too?

I have taken my motorcycle Direct Access at 27 years old, having driven cars and passed my car test nine years ago in Poland

However, my friend has told me I will lose my whole licence (which is now British, as I live in Britain) if I accumulate six points in the two years after I pass my test, is this true? If it is, I wish I had not bothered taking my bike test!

Answer: Your friend is wrong but a few people would make the same mistake. Your first licence was obtained in a European Union country, so it is treated as a British licence under EU Treaty Rules. Your position is no different to any other full British licence holder.

The date of your first full licence, in your case a car licence, means the timer started running on the day that you passed your Polish test and obtained a full Polish licence.

For the first two years, had you accumulated six UK points on your UK licence (and there is no method of putting foreign points, including EU points, on a British licence) then your car licence would have been revoked. You would then have had a provisional UK licence and you would have had to take your theory and practical tests again for any class of vehicle you wish to ride or drive.

The Road Traffic (New Drivers) Act 1995 treats the first two years after getting a full licence as 'probationary'. The test is, when did your licence stop being provisional? If you hold a non-provisional licence, it is treated as a full licence under EU regulations, whether for car or motorcycle and once the two years has expired, your probationary period ends.

However, if you accumulate six points in your first two years of a full licence, your licence is simply lost. There are no appeals, no court hearings, just a letter telling you that your licence has been revoked and you then have to apply for a fresh provisional and start all over again. However, this does not apply nine years after you got your first full licence.

Recent holders of full licences need to be very careful about this Act. If you are pulled over by a Police constable in the first two years of holding a full licence for minor speeding, or if he pulls you over for a duff brake light and a bald tyre, you could instantly lose your full licence, if you have not held it for two years, if you passed your car and bike tests in close succession, you lose both.

The police are fully aware of this and it is at contacts like this when your attitude becomes absolutely crucial. A police officer will either give you words of warning or, if the defect is more serious, he can give you a vehicle rectification notice, without points.

A bad attitude means you will be written up and points win a lot of trips on the bus. This is not about a power-crazed copper setting out to ruin your life. Most police officers assess whether or not words of warning are sinking in. A much better response to being pulled over is to promise to rectify your ways, fix your brake light, replace your bald tyre, keep an eye out for speed signs or whatever it is that has drawn police attention, if the copper is a powerhungry numpty intent on ruining your riding career, then a couple of minor infractions can do this. Speed cameras are immune to persuasion, so do not trip two of these as a new driver.

As a general proposition, it is wise to avoid any police attention in the first two years after your provisional licence has been changed to a full one, whether for a car or a motorcycle. So look after your bike and don't risk a 'silly' pull. Keep your lights working and your tyres good, don't have a noisy can and while small plates and a black visor don't attract points, they attract police attention. For the first two years of a full licence, keep a low profile, obey speed limits and avoid behaviour likely to attract police attention.

## View from the Saddle -Al Conspicuity - I'm all for it

Conspicuity, or the art of being conspicuous, defined as 'easily seen or noticed; readily visible or observable' Stu explained clearly in last month's Treads, that conspicuity is not all about the Hi-Viz and daylight running headlights; there also has to be a large element of you making yourself conspicuous to other road users in your ride plan.

A guick search on Google and I am drawn to the study carried out in the US called Motorcycle 'Enhancing Conspicuity Awareness in Iowa'. A scintillating read.... It is a study of motorcycle crash data in the US to determine any correlation between conspicuity and collisions with motorcycles. It does reference its own research in the state of lowa as well as balancing views from studies throughout the States and worldwide. Some of the studies referred to evidenced reduction in fatal motorcycle crashes with riders wearing hi visibility clothing/helmets, while other studies showed no measurable difference at all. One of the interesting pieces of information it referred to, was a 'Rider Conspicuity Campaign in Minnesota' where an e-survey was carried out asking web site visitors to give a top 10 Hi-Viz riding tips chosen from a list of 20 suggestions. The top 10 tips were: -

- · Fluorescent/reflective safety vest
- · White helmet
- · Brightly-coloured jacket
- · Strategic lane positioning
- · Headlight modulation
- · "Flash your tail light"
- · Reflective materials

- Movement
- · Auxiliary driving lights
- · Hand signals

All of them increase conspicuity, but not all of them need to be purchased from your local bike store. Our 'package' of conspicuity has to be a combination of clothing, equipment, accessories and actions (how we all apportion this will be personal to all of us) and although it won't ever be the ultimate impregnable 'magic cloak' there must be a better chance of influencing other road users to see us, avoid us and not give them an opportunity to say 'Sorry mate I didn't see you'....

### **Speeding Penalties** - Morton

Naturally, none of us would *think* of deliberately exceeding any speed limits, but for those of us whose concentration isn't what it was I offer the following table to remind us of the consequences of getting caught:

Speed limit (mph)	Recorded speed (mph)		
20	21 – 30	31 - 40	41+
30	31 – 40	41 - 50	51+
40	41 – 55	56 - 65	66+
50	51 – 65	66 - 75	76+
60	61 - 80	81 - 90	91+
70	71 – 90	91 - 100	101+
Sentence range:	Band A fine	Band B fine	Band C fine
Points/ disqualify:	3 pts	Disqualify 7 - 28 days OR 4 - 6 pts	Disqualify 7 - 56 days OR 6 pts

"Where an offender is driving grossly in excess of the speed limit the court should consider a disqualification in excess of 56 days."
